




Susanna Silicani, a designer & fashion model from Milan Fashion Week, answers the questions you have all been dying to know about fashion world in Italy.

Q. How has your work evolved since you began?

My biggest lesson was that we should not rush things. It is especially prevalent in corset making and returning to a previous phase is sometimes impossible so instead of beginning from the start it is better to be more careful. I do not like making correction but I do realize that they are sometimes necessary for the final effect.

For me, hurting others is unacceptable. One shouldn't tolerate plagiarism. If fashion is what you truly love then work hard and gain experience. Hard work does pays off.

GLOBAL INEQUALITY WILL COME TO AN END WITH INTERNET. READ HOW?

INDIA TO BE FASTEST GROWING



India will become the fastest growing large economy in the world, eclipsing China, in 2018 and the country's equity market will jump to become the fifth largest in the world, a report says.

According to a Sanctum Wealth Management report, when the rest of the world offers low growth and insufficient structural change, India, by contrast, is seen as a reforming economy with the prospect of strong long-term growth.

Moreover, India also benefits from a favourable contrast to other emerging markets. In particular, the fact that China is down-shifting to a slower pace of growth. As per the report, a major factor that has changed is that the domestic buyer now sets market prices. The report that identifies various big-picture trends at play this year in the domestic and global economy, noted that Aadhaar, Jan Dhan, Demonetisation, GST, are working to create a new inclusive infrastructure in India.

BITCOIN WILL 'TOTALLY COLLAPSE' EVEN IF IT TAKES 100 YEARS: NOBEL PRIZE WINNER

Nobel laureate Robert Shiller is fairly confident bitcoin will collapse, but he's not quite sure when that collapse will occur. Shiller, a Yale University professor who won the Nobel Prize for Economics in 2013, told CNBC that bitcoin will likely "totally collapse and be forgotten," although it could linger for as long as 100 years.

Interestingly, this is not the first time Shiller has been critical of Bitcoin. Last year he commented on the digital currency's rise, attributing it to the mystery factor behind its creator and the peoples' frustration with the existing financial system and status quo.

The Yale University professor said there are "bubbles everywhere," not just in bitcoin, and added that he "doesn't know what to make of bitcoin ultimately."

"SUCH A FUTURE WOULD NOT COME TO PASS"

Really? Like what?

With Bitcoin, supporters hope for a future where they are in complete control of their finances as opposed to centralized governmental bodies. However, critics such as JPMorgan CEO Jamie Dimon have repeatedly stated that such a future would not come to pass, since governments would not allow economic control to slip away.

"It has no value at all unless there is some common consensus that it has value. Other things like gold would at least have some value if people didn't see it as an investment," Shiller told CNBC in an interview.

Last week, billionaire investing genius Warren Buffett also expressed confusion over the rise of Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies, and predicted that the bubble would inevitably pop. "In terms of cryptocurrencies, generally, I can say with almost certainty that they will come to a bad ending," Buffett said on CNBC. "When it happens or how or anything else, I don't know."

At the moment, Bitcoin and the whole cryptocurrency market is struggling under the pressure of regulations and bans from countries such as China and South Korea, which represent major trading hubs.

So what's the story right now?

Bitcoin and rival cryptocurrencies like Ethereum and Ripple still have plenty of room to run. One analyst from Saxo Bank, which accurately forecast that Bitcoin would triple in value in 2017, recently said that Bitcoin could peak to over \$50,000, or even \$100,000 this year.

BUDGET 2018: WHICH INDUSTRY PAYS THE MOST TAXES?

While finance minister *Arun Jaitley* had announced in his first full budget in 2015 that corporate income tax rates would be rationalized in the following years, we are yet to see significant action on that front. In the last three Union budgets, there have been some limited measures to cut the marginal income tax rate to 25% for a small section of companies, but the overall tax structure has remained unchanged. As a result, thanks mainly to various rules and exemptions, we have the situation where companies of different sizes and in different industries pay income tax at vastly different rates. A recently published data set offers us an insight into this.

Aswath Damodaran, Professor of Finance at New York University who is widely considered to be a guru of valuation, puts out an annual data set that contains metrics that are considered important to valuing companies. These metrics include measures of cost of capital, discount rates, valuation multiples, cash flow, etc. Each January, Damodaran collects data for a large number of listed global companies (this year's list contains over 42,000 companies) and then provides averages based on region and industry.



India's steel sector, which has the largest number of companies at 158, is the most taxed at 43%, followed by electronics, entertainment, hotels and alcohol.

Apple has topped Fortune's annual list of the World's Most Admired Companies for the 11th consecutive year.

Apple finished ahead of Amazon, the runner-up for a second consecutive year, while Google's parent Alphabet, Warren Buffett's holding company Berkshire Hathaway, and coffee chain Starbucks rounded off the top five. Apple topped the list in every category, such as innovation, quality of management, social responsibility, use of corporate assets, financial soundness, quality of products and services, and global competitiveness. More on Fortune methodology:

As we have in the past, Fortune collaborated with our partner Korn Ferry on this survey of corporate reputations. We began with a universe of about 1,500 candidates: the 1,000 largest U.S. companies ranked by revenue, along with non-U.S. companies in Fortune's Global 500 database that have revenues of \$10 billion or more. We then winnowed the assortment to the highest-revenue companies in each industry, a total of 680 in 29 countries. The top-rated companies were picked from that pool of 680; the executives who voted work at the companies in that group.

A New Era for Global Health - Bill Gates -Affordability of Health Care

The global community is striving to bring quality healthcare to every human on the planet. The question remains as to how new leadership, policy and business models can make this reality.

The last decades have seen significant and widespread progress, but there is still work to be done.

Bill Gates, Co-Chair, Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, is confident about changes that have happened in health in the last 20 years, saying: "It's not easy to get the aid funding we need but overall since 2000 when GAVI was announced, then Global Fund showed up a few years later, aid levels focused on health went up dramatically in that period. In 1960 20% of all children died before the age of 5 - today if you omit the war zones there is nowhere with a 20% mortality rate."

EU and the Gates Foundation announced \$50m of investment in healthcare in Africa.

Malala in Davos: We need to teach boys to be men

The education of young men on the subject of women's rights is a crucial step to ending gender inequality, Malala Yousafzai said during a session in Davos. "When we talk about feminism and women's rights, we're actually addressing men," she said.



Airlines must address passenger grievances quickly and ensure high service quality, the aviation ministry's secretary said, adding the ministry will step in if things don't change.

The warning follows various complaints on social media by air passengers and a damaging report by a Parliamentary Standing Committee on Transport, Tourism and Culture this month that criticised the training process adopted by the airlines.

"I will certainly accuse airlines of their inability to address individual passenger grievances in a speedy and convincing manner. It is there where I think airlines are guilty in my opinion," civil aviation secretary Rajiv Nayan Choubey said in an interview.

Hiring the cheapest manpower and running the cheapest airline won't ensure quality, Choubey said, adding airline staffers should be trained to offer a high level of service.

Italy's economy minister said he was more worried about a possible international trade war than a tussle over currency exchange rates, following comments by the U.S. Treasury Secretary welcoming a weaker dollar.

U.S. Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin played down his previous comments about the dollar, which had sent the U.S. currency reeling the day before.

Asked whether he was alarmed by Mnuchin's original comments, Padoan replied: "There is a concern if this goes beyond what is acceptable, but I am not so much concerned."

While vulnerable to clashes over trade and affected by the exchange rate, Europe's economy is strong and the most important factors are investment and productivity, Padoan said, adding that this applied to his native Italy.

Padoan struck a reassuring note about Italian elections set for March 4, in which he will stand for the ruling center-left Democratic Party (PD) and which looks unlikely to produce a clear winner.

"There is the risk of a hung parliament and therefore a period of uncertainty may come, but I am also confident this ... will not impact on the strong performance of the Italian economy we are seeing now," he said.

ITALIAN DELEGATION SHOWS INTEREST TO INVEST IN NALCO'S ANGUL ALUMINIUM PARK, ODISHA

Italian Consul General in India stressed on an improvement of bilateral relations between India and Italy

A visiting high-level delegation from Italy has evinced interest in investing at the aluminium downstream park at Angul (Odisha). The cluster spreading 240 acres, is being developed jointly by National Aluminium Company (Nalco) and stateowned Odisha Industrial Infrastructure Development Corporation (Idco).

The delegation led by the Consul General of Italy comprised Italian Aluminium Association, chief executive officers and senior executives of different Italian organisations. They held talks with senior Nalco executives and officials of the Odisha government at the seminar on 'Indo-Italian Metal Hub' organised by the Aluminium Association of India (AAI). Damiano Francovigh, Italian Consul General in India stressed on an improvement of bilateral relations between India and Italy, saying, "Strengthening economic cooperation between India and Eastern India will go a long way in improving relations between Italy and India.

The Indo-Italian Metal Hub seminar titled 'Aluminium Age' is also an effort in that direction", he said. Speaking on the occasion, Odisha's industries minister Niranjan Pujari said, "Odisha offers the perfect ecosystem to be the Hub of Aluminium sector and we are committed to forging strong economic tie with Italy. The molten aluminium can be directly obtained from Nalco when the Angul Aluminium Park becomes operational." Sanjeev Chopra, principal secretary (industries) with the Odisha government said, "This visit by the Italian delegation team has come at a very opportune time as the future looks bright for investors looking at investing in the aluminium sector.





While the number of people with jobs is at a record high, analysis of the types of employment shows many aren't permanent

Italy's employers are increasingly relying on temporary workers, taking the shine off positive labor numbers and leaving a weak spot in the economic recovery.

While the number of people with jobs is at a record high and unemployment fell in November to its lowest in five years, an analysis of the types of position tells a more complex story.

TEMPORARY RECOVERY?

Number of employed rose by 1.1 million since May 2014, but 58% in temporary jobs

About 1.1 million more Italians are employed compared with when the country embarked on the latest overhaul of its labor market by offering benefits for open-ended contracts. But almost six out of 10 of those fixed-term jobs, according to Bloomberg News calculations based on data from the statistics office.

Former Premier Silvio Berlusconi, leader of a center-right bloc of parties with close to 40 percent support in polls, called this week for a review of the labor code, citing the number of temporary jobs.

Similar calls have been made by the Five Star Movement, which is the strongest single party in all voting-intention surveys, adding pressure on the Democratic Party.

As in many other European countries, the Italian government has tried to squelch fixed-term jobs, but they have still surged.

To reduce the use of part-time and fixed-term contracts, the government may consider a new round of incentives for businesses after an old measure first introduced in 2014 was phased out, Finance Minister Pier Carlo Padoan said in an interview with Corriere della Sera daily published.



FACING ISSUES WITH FILING YOUR GST RETURNS

As GST rolled out on July 1, 2017, every business will have to file monthly GST returns as part of its GST compliance. Even if there is no activity carried out in business, the business has to still file the returns. Let us check out the various returns to be filed by businesses and their respective due dates. The return has to be e-filed and no paper returns will be acceptable in the GST regime. The table below explains various returns and their due dates which must be filed by businesses under the GST regime.

RETURN	FOR	TO BE FILED BY
GSTR 1	Outward supplies made by taxpayer (Sales)	10th of the next month
GSTR 2	Inward supplies received by a taxpayer (Purchase)	15th of the next month
GSTR 3	Monthly return	20th of the next month
GSTR 4	Quarterly return for Composite Taxpayer	18th of the month next to quarter
GSTR 5	Return for Non-Resident Foreign Taxpayer	Last day of registration
GSTR 6	Return for Input Service Distributor (ISD)	15th of the next month
GSTR 7	Return for Tax Deducted at Source	10th of the next month
GSTR 8	Return for e-commerce operator	10th of the next month
GSTR 9	Annual Return	31st December of next financial year

Monthly GST Returns Filing.

Regular taxpayers would have to file GSTR-1, GSTR-2 and GSTR-3 (monthly returns). Taxpayers with multiple registrations within a state would have to file GSTR-1, GSTR-2 and GSTR-3 for each of the GST registrations obtained separately. All the monthly returns have to be filed online through a common portal managed by the Goods and Service Tax Network (GSTN)

Annual GST Return Filing

Each business will have to file an annual return, known as GSTR 9. This will be on top of the monthly returns and is to be filed by 31st December of the next financial year.

Composite Taxpayer and GST Filing

Composite taxpayers will have to file GSTR 4, which will be filed quarterly. The composite tax will be a flat rate of tax, which a business pays based on their turnover in a specific period. They will not be able to take input credits for their purchases. Taxpayers eligible for the composite scheme can opt against the composite scheme and file monthly returns and thereby claim input tax credits on their purchases/supplies as well. Annual return (GSTR-8) will be filed by all normal / regular taxpayers. It will be based on financial records. A compounding taxpayer will also need to file a simple annual return. With GST, though the taxes are getting simplified which is a good for all businesses, there may be an increased burden of compliances on businesses as they have to file a total of 37 returns in year (3 x monthly returns for 12 months; and one return annually)


The biggest lesson that I learn't since the initial days of my clothing line is to listen & respect everyone.






Q. What is your favourite positive saying?





ABOUT HER BOOK "THE SCRIBE OF SIENA"



Equal parts transporting love story and gripping historical conspiracy—think The Girl with a Pearl Earring meets Outlander—debut author Melodie Winawer takes readers deep into medieval Italy, where the past and present blur and a twenty-first century woman will discover a plot to destroy Siena. *The Scribe of Siena* is the captivating story of a brilliant woman's passionate affair with a time and a place that captures her in an impossibly romantic and dangerous trap—testing the strength of fate and the bonds of love, which makes it a must read.

Q. When did you first realize you wanted to be a writer?

I've always been a writer, since childhood, really I actually can't remember a time when I didn't think of myself that way. I wrote constantly when I was a kid, and kept writing through high school, college and after that journals, essays, poetry, sometimes short stories. I tried to write a novel when I was 15 but I was just too young. When my 10th grade English teacher asked everyone in the class to come up with a oneword self-description, I immediately chose "Storyteller" because that's fundamentally how I thought of myself - it's what I loved to do.

Q. How long does it take you to write a book?

I've only written one, and finishing a draft took about 3 and a half years. Then I spent about a year and a half editing, then found an agent, and edited more before publishing. From the moment I started writing to publication was seven years

Q. Where do you get the ideas for your books?

Information: Books, articles, expert in the field, Internet. Ideas: Small will things can spark an idea. Perhaps a single sentence in an otherwise dull archeological monograph will suddenly give rise to a powerful scene, or seeing birds flying overhead when I'm running for the subway. Sometimes what people have said decades ago will find their way into my writing. It feels like ideas they come out of nowhere and I'm always so grateful when they do.

Q. What do you like to do when you're not writing?

Ashtanga yoga, reading, traveling, cooking, gardening, playing cello, playing tennis, walking.

Q. What does your family think of your writing?

They all love the fact that I write, each in their own specific way. When my son was 8, he got through half of my book before his teacher made him stop because it was getting in the way of his other work. My oldest daughter is always telling me how inspired she is by what I've done. And my younger daughter gave me the best piece of writing advice I've ever had I was reading a book by Muriel Sparks called Memento Mori and I suddenly said "I wish I could write like this!" and she said: "Mama, you can only write the way YOU write." Great advice. So true.

Q. What would you say is your interesting writing quirk?

I wrote most of my first book on the NYC Subway. I thanked the Metropolitan Transit Authority in my acknowledgements. I write on the subway in part because that's when I have the time but also because I have always loved writing on trains. I always have. In fact, I'm writing the answers to these questions on an Amtrak train from Washington, DC to NYC right now!

Q. What was one of the most surprising things you learned in creating your book?

When I was writing my first novel, had no idea whether it would keep going. I wondered whether it would just stop and there were times I didn't know where the story was going to go and come from. But it just kept coming and then it was written. And when I was editing, I was amazed at how much revision I was capable of. Things I really didn't think I could do, I did. The process gave me a surprising level of confidence in my own writing.

Q. Do you hear from your readers much?

Yes! I love that. I have a great group of fans and they inspire me. They all hope for another book, and that is particularly inspiring. One reader said, "I just finished reading this astonishing book.. absolutely loved it. Given what you do for a living I am amazed you were able to find time to do such a wonderful job on all the necessary research for this book. Yes, you can give up your day job now.:)"

Q. What do you think makes a good story?

Anything can make a good story if it's told well. A story that never leaves a single room, one that involves only one person, can be as exciting as one that spans centuries and countries with generations of people.

Q. Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strongly?


I think anyone can be a writer. Maybe someone who doesn't have intense emotions would write more intense ones to experience them, or maybe be more restrained which could evoke more emotion in a reader.

Q. If you could tell your younger writing self anything, what would it be?

First: Never never never give up! I didn't, and in part because others encouraged me not to. And now look—my dream came true. And second: keep writing, and write for the love of it, even when it's your "work." And I'm still writing fiction, and even though it's now a "profession," it's still for love.


DEVIKA DAS, INDIA



Q. When did you first realize you wanted to be a writer?

I never thought of becoming a writer. I used to pen down my thoughts randomly. For eg, while waiting for my school bus I wrote a poem on 'The Morning Sky'.

Q. How long does it take you to write a book?

Maximum 1 and a half years. Personally, research about the topic is a time consuming affair.

Q. What is your work schedule like when you're writing?

I write for 1-2 hours daily when I am motivated to write on a topic. Favorite times are early in the morning or late evening. I write when I find my peace of mind.

Q. What would you say is your interesting writing quirk?

I had written a poem while taking shower because I had a bad day at school.

Q. Where do you get the ideas for your books?

Currently, I am writing Non-Fiction, so it is just about sharing my experiences and the lessons I have learned from life.

Q. When did you write your first book and how old were you?

I wrote 7 Vows of Marriage in 2016 when I was above 30. Writing this book is an experience.

Not so much. It requires some effort from my side to avail regular feedback. But the little feedback that I have received has been a mixed response with the balance tilting towards positive feedback.

Q. Do you like to create books for adults?

I have not attempted to write children's books.

Q. What do you think makes a good story?

A good thought process which exhibits a good concept including interesting storytelling skills.

Q. As a child, what did you want to do when you grew up?

I was confused. I wanted to become an actor or do something creative although I was a topper in school. I also wanted to study in a foreign university like Harvard or Oxford. So it was never planned for me. I accepted life as it unfolded.

Q. Do you try more to be original or to deliver to readers what they want?



AUTHOR OF POULOMI'S ABODE OF THOUGHTS & UPCOMING BOOK FROM THE TRIP OF LADAKH



Q. If you could tell your younger writing self anything, what would it be?


Keep writing! As a younger self I used to leave writing quite often due to lack of patience and perseverance.

Chandi has a master's degree in Florentine Renaissance history. She loves teaching history and helping people have a great time in Italy via her trip planning services.

Q. When did you first realize you wanted to be a writer?

When I was about 7 years old I started writing stories. Then from age 19 to 21, I traveled all over Europe & Asia and kept journals. I constantly wrote up my travel adventures, always wondering about someday writing a book.

Q. How long did it take you to write your book and what genre do you write in?

My memoir, Return to Glow, came out in April of 2017, and took me more than five years of on and off writing. The total writing time, if I don't include the gaps, was probably three years. The genre I write in is memoir. Return to Glow was my first and I am working on another.

Q. What is your work schedule like when you're writing?

I work best late at night. During the day I get all the other details of my life taken care of, and when I finally feel I can focus on my writing, it is often 10:00pm or later. If I am on roll with my writing, I will stay up working until 2:00am. I eat chocolate to keep me going!

Q. Where do you get the ideas for your books?

I get my ideas from my travels.

Q. What do you like to do when you're not writing?

I enjoy teaching history, and doing travel planning for people who need help creating their trips to Italy. My favorite things in the world are swimming in warm turquoise sea and biking around Florence, Italy. I also like to hike and paddle board, and visit wineries. I enjoy food and wine—consuming it and writing about it.And I adore travel—particularly "slow travel" where I experience a place and a culture in an indepthway.

Q. Do you have any suggestions to help me become a better writer? If so, what are they?

Don't expect it to be easy. Expect to work hard. Develop a thick skin. Get beta readers for your manuscript, and set your ego aside and be seriously open to feedback. Learn what a narrative arc is and now to create one in your story. Get help from a professional developmental editor, or take a class. Be patient and be persistent and treat the project like a degree program— there is more to learn about wiring a good book than most people would think!

Q. Do you hear from your readers much? What kinds of things do they say?

I have received fan emails which is always heart-warming. In early January I received one from a man who said, "One of the most wonderful things that happened to me in 2017 was the chance to read your book." This was special to hear particularly because I originally thought that my book would be much more appealing to women.

Q. As a child, what did you want to do when you grew up?

A writer, a photographer, and a traveler.

Q. What other authors are you friends with, and how do they help you become a better writer?

The authors I look up to, I don't know personally, however, I can learn from them by studying how they crafted their books.

Q. How do your books get published?

Two main options: Traditional or Indie. Indie publishing has become an accepted and perfectly respectable method these days. However, I don't recommend just throwing a book up on Amazon that only you have worked on.

I recommend doing all the due diligence that will make your book look like it was published by a traditional publisher. That means hiring developmental editors, copy editors, and getting the cover design and the interior formatting done by professionals.

Q. Do you think someone could be a writer if they don't feel emotions strong?

No, not if you are writing novels or memoir. (If you are writing dry medical journals, OK.) Being a writer of novels or memoirs takes artistry, creativity, passion, and an interest in the human psyche. Writing takes courage, and no genre of writing takes more courage than memoir. To write a good memoir you've got to be vulnerable on the page and how will you do that if you're not willing to delve into emotions?

I put this quote at the beginning of my book by Brené Brown: "Courage means to tell the story of who you are with your whole heart," it is a great summation of the process of writing memoir.


ITALIANO TASTE WITH CHEF ANDREA SHAKTY MISSERI

BAGEL WITH ZUCCHINI GRILLED PRAWN COCKTAIL & ROCKET WITH RED HOMEMADE CHIPS

Bagel is a jewish bread with a long lievitation cooked with steam and brushed with seeds, it has a long story of New York bakeries and is easy to carry and preserves well, when old in US they slice thin and fry for accompain soups.

The recipe to make this bread vary from country to country but has in common the use of liquid malt and the steam sealing of the donught, I change bagel menu every few days wich give a lunch break the change to enjoy different filling and i go from mediterranean flavours to classic northern salmon or pastrami to original Italian buffalo mozzarella basil mayo and parma ham .



INSALATA DI CARCIOFI ROMANI BUFALA ROMANA

This is the winter version of the classic caprese, its a combination of a good buffalo balL, and roman style artichokes which have to boe made in a long way from cleaning them soaking in lemon water, then partially boil partially steam with olive oli, water, wine, garlic, mint, salt, parsley and few anchovies, in a covered deep pan. The resultis tender and juicy match perfect with the buffalo fresh flavour and the Sardina Bottarga (made from fish egg roe) is the final link between a vegetable and dairy cheese. So in winter dont ask for Caprese the tomatoes in (Italy) won't taste good.



FRITTO MISTO ROMANO

This dish was presented in Kolkata first time at Mangio Alipore last july 2017, previously I read a book from Madhurai Jaffrey of regional Indian recipes, found that Bengal people eat a lot of morsels and expecially pumpkins so i decide to make a close to home fritto misto . The surprise was to find zucchini flowers ready to fry, then I made Panelle which is a dough made from chick pea flower mold like Doklas and fry, I ordered lots of big seedless olives and stuffed with garlic Parmesan parsley, bread crumbs ready to crumb fry (olive Ascolane) finally the rice Arancini with peas and saffron or cacio cheese and black pepper. Yes its a party mix shareable and good to go around with a drink, a big success indeed with the Italian Consulate party held with Novotel staff last November .
